Program Notes

A Timeless Vision

"A Timeless Vision" is a three movement suite for jazz ensemble itten in the style of Duke Ellington. This suite was specially comissioned for the 50th Anniversary of the Music Department at UW-Eau Claire.

the work features a variety of soloists and was composed to showcase the many strengths of the current ensemble. The first movement of the site is a slow ballad in the Latin style. The movement starts with solo tenor saxophone that isolates the interval of a tritone. This interval is the basis for the entire work. The second movement features the mpet section and is a medium-tempo blues. The third movement features the drums and entire ensemble in an up tempo tune that switches from AABA form to a blues. Each movement is written for a rember of my family. Movement I is dedicated to my wife, Teresa, Movement II is dedicated to my son, Joseph, and Movement III is dedicated to my daughter, Annisa. (D. The Queen's Suite

This recording consists of three extended pieces written for special classions. The loveliest of the three, and indeed one of the most gorgeous of all the longer compositions in the Ellington book, is "The Queen's Suite." It's an Ellington-Strayhorn collaboration which commorates the orchestra's appearance before Queen Elizabeth at a jazz festival in Leeds in 1958. Three exquisitely lyrical, evocatively entitled segments highlight the work: "Sunset and the Mocking Bird," "Sucrier Velour," and the splendid piano-and-bass duet, "The Single Petal of a Rose." (There's a story associated with this suite which is too good to go unnoted. With typically extravagant gallantry, Exington recorded "The Queen's Suite" at his own expense, allowed just one copy to be pressed into vinyl, and had that unique album divered to Her Majesty at Buckingham Palace. It wasn't until after Exington's death that the suite was at last released.)

Jazz Ensemble I has earned its second national award in three years. The ensemble took top honors as "Best College Big Band" for 1998—as it did in 1996—in one of the most prestigious jazz contests in the country.

Down Beat magazine, the premier jazz publication in the United States, announced the honor in a spring 1998 edition which featured the magazine's annual student music award winners. For educational institutions this award is similar to the Grammy Awards—it is the highest possible honor a jazz program can receive, because of the reputation of the magazine issuing it.
