HENRY CHARLES SMITH

Henry Charles Smith, associate conductor of the Minnesota Orchestra, conducts more than sixty concerts each season, ranging from subscription programs to young people's events. His commitment spans a variety of programs, including Weekender and Family Concerts, summer festival and pops events, and concerts in the parks. For nine seasons he has led the annual holiday performances of the Nutcracker with the Minnesota Dance Theatre. In all, since joining the Minnesota Orchestra in 1971, Mr. Smith has conducted over 500 Minnesota Orchestra events.

Henry Charles Smith is also a renowned trombonist and euphonium soloist; his recordings and musical editions are recognized internationally. As a soloist and chamber music player with the Philadelphia Brass Ensemble, he has had three Grammy Award nominations, earning a Grammy Award for The Antiphonal Music of Gabrieli. His recording of the Hindemith Trombone Sonata with pianist Glenn. Gould has been widely acclaimed.

As a performer, Mr. Smith has commissioned four works for his instruments, including Alan Hovhaness' Symphony No. 29 for Euphonium and Orchestra; as a conductor, he has offered several first performances, including the American premiere of Prokofiev's Symphonic Song in 1979, and a year earlier, the world premiere of Ani Maayani's Guitar Concerto.

In addition to his career as conductor and performer, Henry Charles Smith is involved in multipe educational programs. Among the concepts he has pioneered is the Minnesota Orchestra's Adopt-a-School project. In the summers he teaches conducting classes for gifted high school students. A graduate of the University of Pennsylvania and Curtis Institute of Music, the noted musician has been a faculty member and frequent guest conductor at the National Music Camp at Interlochen, Michigan. During the summers of 1976 and 1977, he conducted the Young Artists Orchestra at Tanglewood, the summer home of the Boston Symphony Orchestra. The author of nine published books and sixteen musical editions, Mr. Smith is in demand as a participant at brass clinics and a speaker at national and state gatherings of music educators.

For many years Henry Charles Smith was principal trombonist of the Philadelphia Orchestra, and for three years he was associate professor of music at Indiana University. He has also been a member of the faculties of the Curtis Institute of Music, Temple University, St. Olaf College and Luther College.
