

PROGRAM

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Beatrice and Benedict Overture Hector Berlioz, arr. Henning

This overture consists of three sections contrasting comedy and romance. The first is light and gay in character, followed by a slow sustained section. The third and largest section is fast, using thematic material from the opening.

Elsa's Procession to the Cathedral from "Lohengrin" Richard Wagner, arr. Cailliet

In this transcription of Elsa's Procession for symphony band, all that Wagner so eloquently describes with orchestra and chorus is given a true and delicate representation with the instrumental framework of the modern band.

Symphony No. 6 for Band Vincent Persichetti

- I. Adagio Allegro
- II. Adagio sostenuto
- III. Allegretto
- IV. Vivace

The Symphony No. 6 for Band was composed in the winter of 1955–56 on commission from the Washington University Chamber Band. The first movement's opening Adagio contains important thematic material that leads to the statement marked Allegro. A hymn taken from Persichetti's "Hymns and Responses for the Church Year," 'Round Me Falls the Night', is the basis for the second movement. The contrasting Allegretto third movement is followed by a breath-taking Vivace finale.

The original score of "Carmina Burana" calls for vocal soloists, three choirs, and large orchestra. The band arrangement, however, is entirely instrumental, the vocal music having been fully incorporated into the instruments of the symphony band.

The inspiration for the texts and score were derived from an anthology of thirteenth-century songs and poems. "Carmina Burana" has come to be recognized as one of the monumental musical works of our time.

The Conductors

DONALD S. GEORGE

Donald S. George received his education at Ohio Weslevan University, the Eastman School of Music, Mannes College of Music in New York City, and Teachers College, Columbia University. He has studied clarinet with Rufus Arey and Robert McGinnis. His teaching experience has been in the public schools of New Jersey, having been Director of Music for the Midland Park, N.Y. Public Schools for the past eleven years. He has also taught at Teachers College, Columbia University, and for the past six summers has been Director of Bands at the Glassboro State College Summer Fine Arts Camp. While at Midland Park, Dr. George organized the first clarinet chair in New Jersey to have a complete and balanced instrumentation. His doctoral dissertation was on the subject of the development and use of the clarinet choir in the American concert band. He joined the faculty of WSU - Eau Claire in September, 1968. At the University he is Director of University Bands and teaches clarinet and conducting. He is also a member of the Faculty Woodwind Quintet and directs the University Clarinet Choir.

DOMINIC G. SPERA

Dominic Spera received his BM, BME, and MME degrees at Indiana University where he also taught for one year in the jazz department and was music director for University Schools. For nine years he was a professional trumpet player on Broadway with David Merrick, playing in the orchestras of such Broadway productions as "How to Succeed in Business Without Really Trying," "Stop the World," "Roar of the Greasepaint," and "On a Clear Day." He has also played trumpet with Radio Center and City Center symphony orchestras, New York City. He toured with Johnny Mathis and the Henry Mancini orchestra and currently plays first trumpet with the Andy Williams and Henry Mancini organizations. He is a composer and arranger of works for brass choir and jazz ensemble, with two works to be published in the spring of 1969. His position at Wisconsin State University – Eau Claire is instructor in trumpet and brass techniques. He also directs the Jazz Ensemble and Brass Choir.

WISCONSIN STATE UNIVERSITY - EAU CLAIRE

Wisconsin State University – Eau Claire is the third largest of the nine State University of Wisconsin with an enrollment of 7,300 and a faculty of 425. There are five schools within the University: Arts and Sciences, Business, Education, Nursing, and Graduate Studies. Within the past 10 years a building program totaling in value 20 million dollars has been completed on the 310–acre campus, and another 13 million is committed in construction now under way or in the planning stage. A Fine Arts Center housing the activities of Music, Arts, and Speech departments is under construction.

The Department of Music at Wisconsin State University - Eau Claire offers high school graduates an opportunity to pursue music as a career. An excellent faculty offers professional training in music for the performer, composer, or teacher. Music students may choose to pursue studies leading to one of four degrees - the Bachelor of Music, Bachelor of Music Education, Bachelor of Arts, or Bachelor of Science.

HEART-O'-THE-NORTH BAND AND CHOIR CAMP

The Heart-O'-The-North Band and Choir Camp sponsored by Wisconsin State University - Eau Claire will be held from June 8 - 20 at Pigeon Lake. It is located in the wilderness of the Chequamegon National Forest in northwestern Wisconsin, about 30 miles south of the Lake Superior part of Ashland and an equal distance north of Hayward. The nearest town is Drummond, Wisconsin located four miles east on Highway 63. The camp occupies about 12 acres and some 1400 feet of shoreline along the north edge of Pigeon Lake. The physical facilities are rustic but comfortable. A single room cabin houses 8 - 12 persons. Cabin furniture includes wardrobes, chests of drawers, lamps, and study tables. Rehearsals will be held under the pines or in the two laboratory buildings. There is a recreation lodge and a dining hall. There are facilities for volleyball, softball, basketball, croquet, badminton, horseshoes, boating, swimming, etc.

The conductor for the camp band will be Donald S. George, Director of University Bands at Eau Claire. Mr. Morris Hayes of the Eau Claire University faculty will be director of choral activities. Additional staff will teach related courses, such as music theory, and so forth. The fees for the two-week camp including meals, lodging and camp fee is \$85.00.
