

International Festivals Invite Jazz Ensemble I To Perform:

The University of Wisconsin-Eau Claire Jazz Ensemble I, under the direction of Robert Baca, will be attending the Montreaux Jazz Festival (Switzerland), and the Graz (Austria), Music Festival in July of 1989. These European festivals are among the world's largest and most prestigious. The invitation to perform at these festivals was based on a competitive taped audition and represents quite an honor for the group. This will be the first time in UW-Eau Claire's history that an instrumental jazz ensemble will have participated in international festivals such as these.

In mid-July, Jazz Ensemble I will fly to Montreaux and perform in the company of some of the greatest jazz musicians of our time. They also will have the opportunity to hear many other outstanding college and high school jazz ensembles from throughout the world in addition to the many professional jazz groups performing at this festival. The first four days will be filled with playing and listening to jazz, along with sight-seeing around the beautiful landscape of the Montreaux area. Then, after crossing the Swiss Alps, they will descend into Graz which is known not only for having characteristics representing all of Europe, but also for having the oldest and largest School for Jazz Studies in Europe! Performances in Graz will include a main stage concert at the Graz Music Festival (in which UW-Eau Claire will be the only American representation of jazz music), a split performance with students from the jazz ensemble from the School of Jazz Studies at the Graz Academy of Music, and a dinner dance for the closing ceremony of the Festival. Sight-seeing in Austria will include trips to Esterhazy's Palace in Eisenstadt, the work place of Joseph Haydn; a day in Vienna to visit the home of Mozart, Beethoven, and Bruckner, and a trip to Salzburg. At the trips' end, the ensemble will fly out of Munich, Germany, after a brief sight-seeing tour of this beautiful city.

We'd Like You To Come Along!

Of the many outstanding bands that have passed through UW-Eau Claire, the 1988-89 Jazz Ensemble I will be the first jazz instrumental group to perform in an international jazz festival. This once-in-a-lifetime opportunity will push students to practice even more diligently, and the exposure to international jazz music will be an experience that will have a lifelong effect. Also, the students will be able to observe, first hand, European culture and the great appreciation Europeans have for jazz music.

Our plans for this international cross-cultural exchange have gained full support from the Chancellor and Director of the University Foundation, and we have developed our strategy for financial backing. As part of our fund-raising efforts, UW-EC's Jazz Ensemble I has been and will be accepting donations (tax deductible), and the group is available to perform for various occasions and is working toward corporate sponsorship. All monies raised will reduce the overall cost for each student.
