

inspired Norman Dello Joio to compose a set of variations. The work consists of a brief introduction, the theme, and five "variants" which send the mediaeval melody through five true metamorphoses, strongly contrasting in tempo and character, and utilizing the possibilities of the band to the highest degree. "Variants on a Mediaeval Tune" was commissioned by the Mary Duke Biddle Foundation for the Duke University Band, and was first performed on April 10, 1963.

The band version of "The Louvre" is taken from the original score of the NBC television special broadcast nationally in November, 1964. In September, 1965, the composer received the Emmy Award for this score as the most outstanding music written for television in the 1964-1965 season. The five movements of this suite cover the period of "The Louvre's" development during the Renaissance, using themes from composers of that time. Edward Downes, noted critic, has written that "a strong melodic vein, rhythmic vitality, an infectious brio and freshness of invention are among the earmarks of Dello Joio's style." This work for band, commissioned by Baldwin-Wallace College for The Baldwin-Wallace Symphonic Band, was premiered March 13, 1966, the composer conducting.

Norman Dello Joio has written about "Fantasies on a Theme by Haydn": "This work for band is based on a theme from a composition for piano by Joseph Haydn. The subtly conceived theme, I concluded, offered an opportunity to fantasize in the musical language of today. The three movements are a constantly varied examination of Haydn's basic idea. The bubbling humor of the first and third fantasies flank a second which is intensely lyric. In the final sense, it is my homage to a composer who will always remain contemporary."

LAWRENCE HARTZELL

A native of the Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania area, Dr. Lawrence Hartzell received his Bachelor of Music degree from Baldwin-Wallace College, Berea, Ohio, and his Master of Music and Doctor of Philosophy Degrees from the University of Kansas. Joining the Wisconsin State University-Eau Claire faculty in January, 1968, he assumed his present duties as head of the music theory - composition division in September, 1969.

Dr. Hartzell has studied composition with Starling Cumberworth of Cleveland, John Pozdro and Edward Mattila of the University of Kansas, Douglass Moore, Vincent Persichetti, and Ernst Krenek (master's classes). He has also studied conducting with Dr. Kenneth Snapp and Dr. George Lawner, formerly of the San Francisco Opera Company. Dr. Hartzell's compositions cover a wide range of performance media including chamber pieces, ballet, symphonic poems and choral works.

RONALD KEEZER

Ronald Keezer is a native of Eau Claire, Wisconsin. After studies at Winona State College, Minnesota, the Berklee School of Music, Boston, Massachusetts, and the Boston Conservatory, he received his Bachelor of Arts degree from Wisconsin State University-Eau Claire. After extensive study in composition at the University of Wisconsin, Mr. Keezer received his Master of Science in Teaching degree from Wisconsin State University-Eau Claire.

He has studied composition, orchestration, and scoring with Dr. Walter May of Eisenhower College, Dr. Peter Tanner of the University of Massachusetts, Dr. George Brambilla of the Boston Conservatory, Herb Pomeroy, John La Porta and William Maloof of the Berklee School of Music, James Progris of the University of Miami, Dr. Bruce Benward, Dr. Robert Crane and Hilmar Luckhardt of the University of Wisconsin. Mr. Keezer is a member of the theory division and director of the University Percussion Ensemble.

IVAR LUNDE, JR.

Oboist Ivar Lunde, Jr. was born in Tonsberg, Norway. He studied at the Conservatory of Music in Oslo, Norway, and at the Mozarteum in Salzburg, Austria. Among his teachers have been Kees Lahnstein and Andre Lardrot. He has been oboe soloist with the Bergen Philharmonic Orchestra "Harmonien", the Oslo Philharmonic Orchestra, and has given recitals which have been broadcast on both European and American radio.

Mr. Lunde is the composer of many works which have been performed both in the United States and Europe, and is the author of several published articles on the oboe. "Une Petite Suite pour Cina", a composition for woodwind quintet, will be released by Franco Colombo, Inc., New York, this year.

In 1964 Mr. Lunde accepted the first chair position in oboe at the Norwegian Opera in Oslo. In 1966 he accepted a position teaching at the University of Maryland and performing with the Woodwind Quintet at that university. Having joined the faculty of Wisconsin State University-Eau Claire in 1968, Mr. Lunde is teaching oboe, music theory, is director of the University Woodwind Ensembles, and a member and coordinator of the Faculty Woodwind Quintet.

GIAN CARLO MENOTTI

Born in Cadigliano, Italy, Mr. Menotti has spent much of his creative life in the United States. He began his composition study under Rosario Scalero at the Curtis Institute of Music, Philadelphia, where he became a close friend of fellow student Samuel Barber. Menotti's fame as a composer rests primarily upon his operatic compositions, among which the more important are, The Medium, The Telephone, The Saint of Bleeker Street, and the first opera written for television, Amahl and the Night Visitors.

RICHARD PUTZIER

Richard Putzier is the senior high music director at Mondovi High School. Mr. Putzier graduated from Mondovi High School and received his Bachelor of Arts and Master of Science in Teaching from Wisconsin State University-Eau Claire.

He studied piano with James Bonn and George Cherry, oboe with Dr. Leo Christy and Ivar Lunde, Jr., and composition with Dr. Walter May and Dr. Lawrence Hartzell of Wisconsin State University-Eau Claire. Mr. Putzier also studied oboe with Rhadames Angelucci, solo oboist of the Minnesota Orchestra. Sonata for Saxophone was composed under the supervision of Dr. Hartzell.

STEPHEN ZENZ

A native of Chippewa Falls and a graduate of Chippewa Falls High School, Stephen Zenz is working toward a Bachelor of Music Education degree. He is a member of the Symphony Band, the University Jazz Ensemble, and the University Percussion Ensemble. Mr. Zenz's "5 Variations on 5" was written under the direction of Mr. Ronald Keezer and is an attempt to employ various elements of chance through improvisation.
