Moved and seconded that "The number of patrons allowed in soft drink and ice cream parlors at any one time shall not exceed 10 and the proprietor of each place will be held strickly responsible for the carrying out of this order. Any failure to comply with this order will be sufficient to reason for closing the establishment during the present epedemic.

It will also be the duty of the Chief of Police to see that this order is carried out.

This order to take effect Nov. 7-1918

Moved and seconded thatthe number of people allowed in a saloon at any one time shall not exceed 12 including proprietor and attendents and the proprietor of each sallon will be held responsible for the carrying out of this order. Any failure to comply with this order will be sufficient reason for cāosing the sallon during the present epedemic.

It will also be the duty of the Chief of Police to see that this order is observed.

Nov 16-1918

At a meeting of the Board of Health, Nov 16-1918, the following additional restrictions to those now in force were ordered.

Begining at midnight, Nov 17-1918, the following additions to the restrictions for the prevention of Influenza to those now in force were ordered--

All saloons will close, ice cream parlors and soda fountains will discontinue.

All clubs and the Y.M.C.A. will close for all purposes except lodging and meals where served at such places.

All stores and places of business are ordered to have clerks and attendents and customers wear masks while in business places otherwise action will be taken to limit the number of persons in said stores and place of business as may seem fit to properly safe gaurd the public.

The public is requested to abstain from attending all gatherings and parties and where necessary to do so, to wear masks in accordance withh specifications below.

These orders to be in effect until further notice.

11-24-1918 to hold one service only.

That all schools be allowed to open 11-26-1918

That sallons be allowed to sell packages only which are
not to be consumed on the premises, sale of bear on
on draft not allowed. The restrictions as to loitering
are not changed.

It is earnestly requested that the clerks in business
places wear masks but it will not be compulsory.
