GUEST CLINICIAN AND BASSOON SOLOIST

John Miller is principal bassoonist in the Minnesota Orchestra. He received his early musical training at the Peabody Conservatory in Baltimore and the New England Conservatory in Boston. He also holds a bachelor of science degree in humanities and engineering from MIT and was awarded a Fulbright grant for music study in Amsterdam. While in Boston, he founded the Bubonic Bassoon Quartet and the Boston Baroque Ensemble and made the first recording ever of the Hummel bassoon concerto, released with the Weber concerto on Cambridge Records. He assumed his present position in 1971, when he also joined the faculty of the University of Minnesota. Since then, he has performed many times as soloist with the Minnesota Orchestra as well as numerous other orchestras, and has traveled throughout the U.S. presenting master classes, recitals, and concerts with the American Reed Trio. In 1984 he recorded the Mozart and Vanhal Concertos for the Pro Arte label with Neville Marriner. His teachers include Louis Skinner, Arthur Weisberg, Stanley Petrulus, Sherman Walt, Stephen Maxym, and Thom de Klerk.

J. S. Bach (1685-1750)

J. S. Bach spent most of his life as a Lutheran organist and the last post of great importance he held was as Cantor of St. Thomas and Music Director in Leipzig, a position of considerable importance in the Lutheran world. He was a virtuoso organist and a great composer of contrapuntal works. He regarded himself as a conscientious craftsman doing a job to the best of his ability for the satisfaction of his superiors, for the pleasure and edification of his fellowmen, and to the glory of God. Bach was trained as a violinist and organist, and organ music first attracted his interest as a composer.

Five Melodies from the "Little Book of Neglected Melodies"

Michael Cunningham

Michael Cunningham: The "Little Organ Book of Neglected Melodies", is a collection of some of the most beautiful melodies in use in the catholic Church before Vatican II. Since the time of that Council many changes and improvements have taken place regarding music. But in the course of events the melodies in this collection are heard with less and less frequency. In these short arrangements Dr. Cunningham has supressed the titles because he feels that the beauty of each melody speaks for itself. Each of the fifteen pieces in the collection focuses on a different compositional texture or performance technique. In that sense they are like etudes.
