J. J. Richards

Though not considered one of the great march writers, J.J.Richards has contributed greatly to the American band repertoire. This march, as well as his others, contains an exciting melodic line, interesting harmonic background and a scintillating rhythmic drive.

Canzona

Peter Mennin

Peter Mennin (born 1923, Erie, Pennsylvania) is a composer regarded by many as the most substantially gifted of the younger composers that have come into prominence since World War II. He has to his credit some six symphonies and many chamber and choral-orchestral works. Mennin composed his Canzona as a part of a series of commissions from Edwin Franko Goldman in cooperation with The League of Composers, and it was first performed by the Goldman Band.

American Civil War Fantasy

Jerry H. Bilik

Jerry H. Bilik was arranger for the University of Michigan bands while he was a student there from 1953 to 1955, arranger for the United States Military Academy Band at West Point from 1955 to 1958, and is presently doing free-lance writing and arranging out of New York City. In this work, the feeling of approaching conflict, the gathering of the armies, the nostalgic reflections of the soldiers, the fierceness of the struggle itself, and the inspiring hope for a united nation, are conveyed through an affectionate treatment of the popular and folk songs of the American Civil War.

Toccata Marziale

R. Vaughan Williams

Although the <u>Toccata Marziale</u> occupies a modest place among the musical creations of Ralph Vaughan Williams (1872-1958), when compared to such towering works as the Fourth, Fifth and Sixth Symphonies, it nonetheless stands among the best concert works of the band literature as a real virtuoso piece. This work was conceived for the band medium and the fundamental properties of the bands sonority, its instrumental virtuosity and color, with strong emphasis upon the fine gradations between long and short, loud and soft, are all brilliantly revealed in its superb scoring.

The Dam Busters

Eric Coates

One of Britain's more prolific composers of this century is Eric Coates, who has made great contributions to the field of band literature. His march The Dam Busters was originally written as the theme for the Associated British Picture of the same title.

Divertimento for Band, Op. 42

Vincent Persichetti

The Divertimento for Band, written by Philadelphia-born Vincent Persichetti (1915- ), is exactly what its name implies--a lively bit of musical entertainment, in which rhythmic and contrapuntal savour faire is blended neatly with tongue-in-cheek humor and lyrical nostalgia. This piece was written in June 1950 for the famous Goldman Band. The six short movements are as follows:

I Prologue II Song III Dance IV Burlesque

V Soliloquy VI March

Cole Porter -- A Symphonic Portrait

The name of Cole Porter immediately brings to mind a quarter-century's output of popular song classics. Porter was born June 9, 1893 in Peru, Indiana. He commenced his career as a composer while an undergraduate at the Yale University, and went on to become one of the top Broadway composers, creating memorable scores for such shows as "Can-Can," "Silk Stockings" and "Kiss Me, Kate."

Suite of Old American Dances

Robert Russell Bennett

Robert Russell Bennett (1894- ) is particularly well known for his brilliant and polished orchestrations of top Broadway musicals; but the fact is that he also has to his credit a wide variety of original works in all forms including six symphonies. The Suite of Old American Dances was written in 1949 and represents a delightfully sophisticated treatment of tunes in the spirit of the American minstrel show and vaudeville. The five movements are as follows:
