Program Notes

Eternal Father, Strong to Save

Claude T. Smith

The music of Claude T. Smith is universally known in the world of wind ensemble music, and although his life was tragically cut short fifteen years ago when he died at the age of 56, his music continues to be featured everywhere. Claude worked as an educational consultant for the Wingert-Jones Company and became staff composer for the Jenson Music Publishing Company. He was an active clinician and guest conductor and the recipient of numerous awards and honors for his compositions and service to music education. Claude was a French horn player, and his music is distinguished in many ways, not the least by his lack of sympathy for the demands of his bwn instrument! Eternal Father, Strong to Save was composed in 1975 and dedicated to the U. S. Navy Band. It opens with a series of fanfares, leading to a lively theme that is treated contrapuntally. Eventually the music subsides not the Navy hymn itself, first heard by the four horns, and then by the full band. A return of the fanfare figures bring the work to an exultant conclusion.

Chanteys

Robert Sheldon

Robert Sheldon is one of the most performed composers of wind band music. A recipient of numerous awards from ASBDA, ASCAP, and Phi Beta Mu, Sheldon's compositions embody a level of expression that resonates with insembles and audiences alike. His music is performed throughout the world appears on several international concert and contest lists. He regularly accepts commissions for new works, producing numerous publications for concert band each year. Chanteys is an original work that recalls the music of the sea and its sailors. A jaunty opening sparkles with character and style before yielding to a pensive "Andante". The piece closes with a spirited juxtaposition of thematic material.

Prelude and Rondo

David R. Holsinger

bavid Holsinger was born December 26, 1945 in Hardin, Missouri. Holsinger, an experienced high school and university teacher, has won several composition contests, including the prestigious Ostwald Award presented by the American Bandmasters Association. Holsinger was a junior at Central Methodist College in 1966 when Czech composer Vaclav Nelhybel visited the campus to guest conduct the band. Inspired by the visit, Holisinger wrote is "Prelude and Rondo" — his first composition for band — in six days

This work comes from a larger piece titled the Enigma Variations. Each of the movements represents an important person in Elgar's life (ex. Movement 1 is his wife). Nimrod is a nickname that he had for his mentor August Jaeger. The nickname comes from the fact Jaeger in German means hunter and Nimrod is the Greek god of hunting. The piece is lyrical innature and has been played by numerous orchestras across the world as a dedication to the victims from the World Trade Center bombings. Elgar wrote most of his works between 1895 and 1925. His most famous work is the Pomp and Circumstance March No. 1, often played at graduation ceremonies.

Variations on a Korean Folk Song

John Barnes Chance

Chance won the American Bandmasters Association Ostwald Award for this work in the year following its composition. He provided the following information concerning the work in the Journal of Band Research for Autumn 1966:

"I became acquainted with the folk song Arrirang (pronounced "AH-dee-dong") while serving in Seoul, Korea in the Eighth U.S. Army Band in 1958-59. The tune is not as simple as it sounds, and my fascination with it during the intervening years led to its eventual use as the theme for this set of variations."

The work is in six sections—the opening pentatonic theme stated by the clarinets followed by five distinct variations. The first variation features temple blocks and woodwinds. Variation two is quiet and serene with the original melody, now inverted, played by the oboe. The third variation is a fast march, the fourth is broad and solemn, and the fifth is more involved with various sections of the band playing one of the two phrases heard in the opening theme.

Robin Hood: Prince of Thieves

.Arranged by Paul Lavender

Originally composed by Michael Kamen for the 1991 movie of the same title, Robin Hood: Prince of Thieves has been masterfully transcribed for band by Paul Lavender. Pulsing with action and romance the arrangement reminds the listener of the adventures of Robin Hood after his return from the Crusades. With an indebted Moor by his side, Robin sets out to avenge his father's death and to save the peasants of Nottingham from their crafty cunning sheriff.

As vice president of Instrumental Publications for Hal Leonard Corporation Paul Lavender has contributed more than 1000 arrangements and compositions to the educational and concert repertoire.

Originally written for four-hand piano, it was transcribed for band by Arthur Frackenpohl. The tempo of a pas redouble varies with the proficiency of the performer(s), as well as the wishes of the composer and the customs of that period. During the mid-nineteenth century, military units in some nations were marching to a cadence of about ninety steps per minute for the slow march (pas ordinaire), 120 for the quick march (pas redouble), and 160 to 180 for the double-quick march (pas de charge). Frackenpohl recommends a tempo of 144 for this march

Biographies

Melissa J. Weis is a senior at the University of Wisconsin – Eau Claire, majoring in Music Education. Upon her graduation in May 2004 she will pursue a career teaching instrumental music at the secondary level. During her years at UW-Eau Claire Melissa has performed on flute in the Wind Symphony and Symphony Band and has sung in the Symphonic Choir. She has been very active in the Blugold Marching Band, serving as the Color Guard Captain and Instructor. Melissa has been the director of the Zorn Arena Pep Band for two years, last year having organized the band's trip to the DIII Final Four in Indiana. For the past three years Melissa has worked extensively with the concert and marching bands at Elk Mound High School. She wishes to thank Mr. Mondlock, band director at Elk Mound High School, and Dr. Dickerson for serving as her mentors, as well as her family, friends, and loved ones for all of their support throughout the years.

Dr. Randal C. Dickerson is Assistant Professor of Music Education at the University of Wisconsin-Eau Claire, where he teaches Principles & Methods of Secondary Music Education, coordinates the student teaching program, conducts the *University Band* and directs the *Blugold Marching Band*. Before coming to Eau Claire, Dr. Dickerson spent 6 years as Assistant Dean for Undergraduate Academic Affairs and Assistant Professor of Music at the University of Illinois. There he coordinated student and curricular affairs for the School of Music, Department of Theatre, Department of Dance, and the Art Education Division. During his seven years as a high school band director in Mississippi and Washington, Dr. Dickerson's ensembles were consistently rated superior and amassed awards from many festivals in the U.S. and Canada. He is a graduate of the University of Southern Mississippi and holds the Doctor of Education (in Music Education) degree from the University of Illinois (1994).
