-PROGRAM NOTES-

Cait Nishimura-Beneath the Canopy

I've always cherished any time spent in the forest. While the mighty and majestic treetops are what I'm drawn to first, I've come to enjoy observing and investigating the environment that exists beneath the canopy. It is here where many birds, animals, and insects make their homes; where mushrooms and mosses magically appear; and where visitors to the forest leave footprints on trails.

Beneath the Canopy is a hopeful, uplifting, and energetic piece for concert band that is meant to evoke a walk through the woods. The layers of melodies and harmonies throughout the piece represent the various levels of the forest, from the ground to the understory and up to the canopy. The colours and textures within the ensemble depict the flora, fauna, and funga of the forest.

Percy Grainger- Irish Tune

Grainger's Irish Tune from County Derry has stood the test of time for a number of reasons: colorful sonorities, straightforward accessibility, and a memorable climax. It is also a versatile piece, playable by both younger band and mature players, symphonic bands and wind ensembles. Irish Tune could balance a heavier work on the concert program, or it could be a thoughtful closing piece just before intermission. The broad appeal of this piece will undoubtedly assure its position atop the wind band repertoire for years to come.

Robert W. Smith-Celtic Carol

Celtic Carol is a setting of traditional melody known during the holiday season as What Child Is This? Featuring the percussion section, this particular setting draws the listener into a traditional Irish celebration. The celebration begins with a mysterious solo statement based on the first lines of the carol and ends with a very exciting conclusion.

Shostakovich, arr. H.R. Reynolds-Prelude, Op. 34; No. 14

The Twenty-Four Preludes for Piano were composed in 1932-33, and the Prelude in E-flat minor, Opus 34, No. 14 was one of this set. Opening with a calm but strong chordal statement, the piece continues to build in a single direction to a grand climax of fff dynamics, after which it quickly returns to the quiet mood and material of the beginning. While only 36 measure long, one senses a much more expansive and lengthy composition than its first few short measures reveal.

Michael Markowski-Shine

Shine is an exploration of brighter instrumental colors within a world of softer, more muted textures. For me, the imagery of light becomes all the more striking when rationed against these darkly romantic landscapes.

You can hear this sort of rationing throughout the piece. For example, the piece begins with a tight, sustained three-note cluster that is meant to induce a kind of quiet, harmonic friction. The saxophones enter first, flickering, and are soon joined by the French horns, whose flutter tonguing intensifies the aural electricity. The rhythmic and melodic energy builds to several short, brighter moments, but these joyful moments don't stay long as we quickly submerge back into the more meditative tones.

Cait Nishimura- Autumn

The origin of the piece goes back to 2008 when Nishimura wrote a free verse poem for an assignment in high school. When trying to decide what to write, she found herself reflecting on how fall was a special time of year because of the colors and emotions she associated with the season. Nearly ten years later, Nishimura found herself reminded of the poem while thinking about the beauty and nostalgia of fall. After finding the poem, she was compelled to set the words to music and completed her composition of Autumn for SATB choir within 24 hours.

David Maslanka-Illumination

"Illumination" -- lighting up, bringing light. I am especially interested in composing music for young people that allows them a vibrant experience of their own creative energy. A powerful experience of this sort stays in the heart and mind as a channel for creative energy, no matter what the life path. Music shared in community brings this vital force to everyone. Illumination is an open and cheerful piece in a quick tempo, with a very direct A-B-A song form.

Illumination: Overture for Band was composed for the Franklin, Massachusetts', public schools. The commission was started by Nicole Wright, band director at the Horace Mann Middle School in Franklin, when she discovered that my grandnephew was in her band. The piece was initially to have been for her young players, but the idea grew to make it the center of the dedication concert at the opening of Franklin's new high school building. Rehearsals of Illumination were actually the first musical sounds made in their fine new auditorium.

Amanda Aldridge (ed. Bove)- On Parade: Quick March

On Parade is an English "quick step" march featuring a typical first and second strain, trio, and an unusual secondary trio area that modulates the piece to a third tonal area. The original 1914 version of the march was published under the male-sounding pseudonym Montague Ring.

The 2020 edition resolves several practical and stylistic issues with the available 1914 Boosey & Hawkes score-less parts that can be found through the U.S. Library of Congress or IMSLP. Instrument parts have been struck or added to modernize the instrumentation. Stylistically, the dynamic range has been expanded and several courtesy slurs and articulation markings have been added to facilitate cleanliness of lines and phrases. Rehearsal letters, measure numbers, and a tempo marking have been added for convenience and errata has been fixed
